





Today we hear about how Jesus called his disciples to follow him. They left what they were doing and went with him straight away. Let's think a bit about how we can follow Jesus in our lives.


#### MARK 1:14-20




In this passage, what is Jesus doing?

Jesus is going and telling others the good news, that he has come to save his people.


This is what it means to be a disciple. A disciple is someone who goes and tells others the good news about Jesus. Jesus is showing us an example for how the disciples are to act in the future.









I miss my family!! Jesus asks us all to follow him. We cannot see Jesus now and go with him as he travels round the country but do some of the things he taught us.
